Depots have been established at the West Side Rink, corner Ada and Randolph streets, at Nos. 50 and 52 North Canal street, and also (probably) at Seavern's warehouse, corner Clark and Fourteenth streets, for the purpose of receiving and distributing provisions, clothing, and other necessa-ries to such as present orders from the Relief Committee. The homeless and hungry can find food and shelter and an abundance of water, at either of the public school buildings, and at all the churches. The Jesuit Church and college building and school house, on South Morgan street, have been opened for the lodging of those unable to find other ac-

The Cathedral of SS. Peter and Paul, corner of Peoria and Washington streets; the Congregational Church, corner of Green and Peorla streets; the Church of the Redeemer, corner of Sangamon and Washington, and Congregational Church, corner of Ann street, are all open to the homeless for food and shelter.

The old Soldiers' Home, on Douglas place, is open for the reception of all who may be homeless in the South Division.

An intelligence offica for the lost is to be locat ed at 7 o'clock this morning at the corner of Twelfth and State streets.

All organizations may, through their respective committees, draw for supplies on the committee in charge of the same at the various depots. They will please advise said committee of the names of persons authorized to draw supplies.

The general headquarters for supplies is at Nos.

50 and 52 South Canal street.

A committee of the citizens of Cleveland, consist-ing of N. B. Payne, W. T. Warner, Colopel W. H. Maynard, David Price, Mr. Mason, Mr. Alford, has arrived in Chicago, bringing with them from five to eight car loads of provisions.

Three car loads of provisions, from an unknown source, arrived on yesterday, on the Michigan

Southern Railway.
