WORLD'S FAIR NOTES

Oak Park will celebrate its 160th birthday Wednesday, Sept. 27, by visiting the Fair and staging a historical pageant in the court of the Hait of Science. The day has been officially designated as Oak Park day. Special ceremonies will be staged at various places throughout the grounds, culminating in a musical program by the Oak Park Symphony orchestra at 8 o'clock in the court of the Hall of Sciences, to be immediately followed by the pageant.

The tentative program for Florida day at the Fair next Monday includes speeches by Gov. David Sholtz, Attorney General Cary D. Landis of Florida, Commissioner of Agriculture Nathan Mayo, Col. H. F. Miller, chief of federal and state participation at the Fair, and President Rufus C. Dawes of the Fair. The ceremonies will from 11:30 a. m. to noon in the Court of States. A reception in the Florida tropical home at 4 p. m. and music at 7:30 p. m. in the Florida Orange grove and at 9:30 p. m. in the Florida state exhibit will complete the program.

The possibility of an exhibit in the Smithsonian institution in Washington, D. C., similar to the "World a Million Years Ago" at the Fair, was indicated when it was learned yesterday that representatives of the natural history department of the institution have made intensive studies of the animals there. They discussed the mechanisms of the various reproductions of prehistoric animals with Harold Messmore and Joseph Damon, who built the exhibit.

Fourteen queens of as many national groups chosen in a contest conducted by the Cleveland News visited the Fair yesterday and were presented with World's Fair medals by Miss Catherine Palmer, Automotive week queen at the Exposition. The queens and the nations they represent are Mary Rody, Ireland; Sophia Ann Bugala, Poland; May H. Ainsworth, England; Lucia Caputo, Italy; Mary Boerin. Rumania; Sue Petersen, Germany; Rose A. Vaczyi, Hungary; Lilian Kuhar, Jugo-Slavia; Harriett Plevka, Czechoslovakia; Alvina Salasavicuite, Lithuania; Catherine Relsig, Austria; Eleana Kohanik, Russia; Peggy Bailey, Scotland, and Gertrude Allerton, America.
